


## UPDATES


- The new RCS principal, Dan Weston, will begin his tenure on May 3.
- The School Committee unanimously approved the Superintendent's budget on Monday, April 12. On Wednesday, April 14 the Budget Advisory Committee also endorsed it. The budget will go before the town meeting on Wednesday, May 19 at 7:30 pm.
- The state is pushing ahead with MCAS but there have been some changes. First, the testing windows have been pushed back a month to May 10-June 11 for grades 3-5 and May 17-June 11 for grades 6-8. Second, individual students in grades 3-8 will only take half each of the usual ELA, Mathematics, and (for grades 5 and 8) STE tests. Students will be randomly assigned to take either the first half or the second half of the test. This means that we will not get a clear understanding of individual student performances, but we will be able to get a sense of the school's performance. Third, schools are required to test remote students. There is no further guidance at this time but we are supposed to receive it by April 26. We will be making arrangements over the next two weeks.
- Kiss and Ride: In our effort to make the arrival and dismissal as efficient and safe as possible I'd like to give a few reminders. First, please remember to have children enter and exit from the right/passenger/sidewalk side. Second, please say goodbyes inside the car so that we can keep the line moving. Finally, please remember that the PreK and K students are dismissed at 2:45, ten minutes before 1-8, so we'd like them to arrive at 2:40. The times are different on Wednesdays when we dismiss at 1:35 and 1:45.
- On Monday, April 12, author James Preller met with our 7th graders to answer questions about the writing process in general and his novel *Bystander* in particular. Students just wrapped up a study of the novel *Bystander* and it was exciting to ask the author questions! This program was made possible by a REEF grant.

- On Wednesday, April 14, the 3rd/4th/5th grade met with children's author, Melissa Stewart to answer questions about non-fiction writing. Mrs. Stewart has written 189 books about animals and humans. The 5th grade participated with the 3rd and 4th grade in a March Madness competition to determine which book by Melissa is the best. This program was made possible by the PTA. Thank you for this awesome opportunity! The author used a response from one of our 4th grade students on her Twitter account. (copied below) The author also took the time to respond to each one of the students. I included a 4th grade example below.

Here's another book that I think you'll enjoy: *Something Rotten: A Fresh Look at Roadkill* by Heather Montgomery. I'm excited that you're writing a book called *The Ways of the Dog*. I hope to see it on my library bookshelf one day.

Mckenzie, Hooray for Pinocchio Rex! I'm excited that you really enjoyed that book. I loved working on it with well-known paleontologist Steve Brusatte. He gave me an amazing glimpse into his world. You might enjoy reading *The First Dinosaur* by Ian Lendler.

Maybe one day you will have a chance to go to Africa, but you can have an adventure right at home this summer. If you read *You're Invited to a Moth Ball* by Loree Griffin Burns, another Massachusetts author, you'll discover how to attract and observe moths late at night. You might spot some that are beautiful shades of bright green, soft pink, and grayish blue.
